#### The Greatest Love

Dear friends of Hope Church,

As we begin this new year of 2025, we are given the opportunity to reflect on the fresh start that a new year brings. It's a time to set goals, renew our hearts, and realign our lives with God's purpose. As we approach Valentine's Day, we are reminded of the greatest love story ever told—the love that Christ has for us, which is the foundation of our faith and our identity in Him.

Faith, Hope and Luck by Andy Stanley



# **Suburban Sharpies and Coopers**

Over the years, I've seen sharp-shinned hawks and Cooper's hawks in our New Holland neighborhood, which adds excitement to it. These look-alike raptors are closely related and mostly prey on birds. Only size and the ends of their tails distinguish them. Sharpies are blue jay-sized and the ends of their tails are squared. Cooper's are crow-sized and have rounded ends to their tails.

Because they are different sizes, they seek different prey. Sharpies mostly catch sparrow-sized birds, while Coop's go after dove-sized victims. Their catching different kinds of birds reduces competition for food between them, which benefits both these birds of prey.

Sharp-shinned and Cooper's hawks are perfectly built for what they do. Both kinds are stream-lined, which helps in swift, maneuverable flight after panicky, feathered prey. And both have powerful wing muscles, and long tails for steering among tree limbs after their meals.

Sharp-shins have never nested in my neighborhood, but through the years, a few migrated through, or wintered here. One October day, a sharpy perched on a weeping willow tree in our yard and watched for house sparrows to show themselves. But no sparrow did and the hawk moved on to seek prey elsewhere.

In January of another year, a sharp-shin caught a house sparrow in a snowfall and ate it on top of the snow on our back lawn, as the snow continued to fall. With a pair of binoculars, I watched the sharpy dine. Feathers flew away on the wind across the snow cover as the hawk ingested the sparrow. When that raptor finished its meal and flew away, I saw only the sparrow's beak and a foot, both of which quickly became buried in snow. Snow covered everything, as if nothing happened.

Cooper's hawks have raised young in my New Holland neighborhood for years. And they ambush mourning doves, house sparrows, blue jays, other kinds of birds, and gray squirrels at times. Being larger hawks, it's exciting to see them flashing through a suburban neighborhood of taller trees and landing in one of them to watch for doves, starlings and other types of birds. I've seen them diving with great speed after doves, and, over the years, I've witnessed a couple of Coop's catching a dove and landing in a tree with its meal. Feathers float to the ground as the raptor dines. I've also seen Cooper's clambering swiftly through bushes after sparrows, which zip out of the shrubbery and gone to other sheltering bushes.

Created by God, as all life on Earth is, sharp-shinned and Cooper's hawks are perfectly built for what they do to make a living, as all life is. These elegant birds of prey are streamlined, and powerful fliers, to snare fast-flying victims. They are intriguing to experience.
