# Winter Thrushes

Three attractive kinds of thrushes- American robins, eastern bluebirds and hermit thrushes- regularly winter in Lancaster County, and much of the northeastern United States. They can do that because they all ingest berries they find on trees, shrubbery and vines in woodland edges, hedgerow thickets between fields, and suburban areas. And they all go to bird feeders to consume grain.

Being related to each other, these thrushes have similar appearances and habits. They are shaped much the same and the young of each species have spotted chests. Robins and hermit thrushes run and stop, run and stop across the ground while searching for invertebrates to eat.

But thrush species have differences, too, which is what made them distinct species. The familiar, handsome robins are gray on top and rusty-red below, while beautiful male bluebirds are sky-blue above and rusty-red underneath. The attractive hermit thrushes are warm-brown above and white below, with rows of dark spots.

Robins nest in suburban areas, but many of them spend much of the rest of the year in local hedgerows and woodland edges where they feed on invertebrates and berries. Bluebirds nest and live in local, overgrown fields and meadows, and along hedgerows the year around. Hermit thrushes raise young in forests farther north from Lancaster County. But a few of them annually winter in local woods and older suburbs.

Many robins drift south to find food through winter. But some remain north and gather into little flocks. In winter they feed mostly on crab apples, berries, and the blue, berry-like cones of red juniper trees in abandoned fields, and along roadsides. Those gatherings of robins spend winter nights in half-grown, protective coniferous trees planted in suburban areas.

Some bluebirds also meander south. But many stay north through winter, eating berries and spending nights in tree cavities, abandoned woodpecker holes and bird boxes. Several bluebirds might cram into a hollow to share body heat.

Only a few, individual hermit thrushes spend winters in local woods and suburbs. Most migrate to Central and South America to avoid winter. But hermits that stay north eat berries and seek shelter for the night in thickets and evergreen trees.

Beautiful birds created by God, these thrush species are adaptable, and tough enough to stay north in winter, including in Lancaster County. They help make time spent outdoors in winter more enjoyable, and inspiring, particularly when seen on the lawns of older suburban areas and at feeders.
