### Was The Resurrection Real?

Dear Beloved Friends of Hope Church,

Easter is a time to reflect on the greatest miracle in history—the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It’s a time when we celebrate that Jesus, who was crucified and died for our sins, rose from the dead, conquering death and offering us eternal life. But in a world filled with doubt, skepticism, and questions, how do we know the resurrection is real?

It’s easy to believe in things we see and experience firsthand, but what about those moments we can’t prove with evidence? Consider the skeptics who question whether we really landed on the moon, suggesting that it was all staged. How do we truly know what’s real, and how can we be certain that the resurrection of Jesus was not just a story or a myth?

Let’s think about the women who visited Jesus’ tomb early on that first Easter morning. They came expecting to find His body, but instead, they were shocked to find the stone rolled away, and the tomb empty. Imagine their confusion and sorrow—had the body been stolen? Or was the resurrection a mere fabrication? Their minds raced, and their hearts were heavy. But then, two angels reminded them of Jesus’ words, that He would die and rise again on the third day. This was no ordinary disappearance—this was the fulfillment of a promise.

The resurrection of Jesus wasn’t just a swoon or a resuscitation. Jesus wasn’t someone who fainted or merely “came back to life” after fainting. He was truly dead—crucified, beaten, and buried. Yet on the third day, He rose, in a glorified, resurrected body, standing before His disciples. He showed them His hands and feet, and even ate with them, proving He was

truly alive, not a ghost or hallucination.

This Easter, we ask: how do we know what's real? How do we distinguish between what's true and what's just a story? In our lives, we often wear different masks, acting differently depending on where we are or who we're with. We may be one person at home, another at work, and yet another when we walk through the doors of the church. But the real question is: who are we, deep down? We're all a mixture of good and bad sinners in need of a Savior. And only Jesus can truly transform our lives, offering us hope through His resurrection.

This monumental event is the ultimate dividing line in history. It's not something we can always prove with logic or scientific evidence. It's a matter of faith. But that faith isn't blind. It's a faith grounded in the testimony of hundreds of witnesses who saw Jesus alive after His death. It's a faith based on a historical event that changed everything.

That empty tomb is the heart of the Christian message. It tells us that death is not the end. Because of Jesus' victory over death, we have hope—not just for eternal life, but for strength to face life's trials. Yes, there are moments of doubt, and we may not always understand why things happen the way they do. But when we place our trust in the risen Jesus, we find hope, even in the darkest moments.

This Easter, we're reminded that the resurrection is real, and it changes everything. Because Jesus rose, we can be forgiven of our sins and made a new creation in Christ. (2 Cor. 5:17) Because Jesus conquered death, we no longer need to fear it. The tomb was empty then, and it remains empty today. The resurrection gives us hope, not just for life after death, but for a transformed life right here and now.

As you reflect on Easter this year, ask yourself: Do I believe the resurrection is real? Will I place my faith in the One who died and rose again, offering forgiveness and eternal life? The empty tomb isn't just a story from the past—it's a living reality, offering us hope, joy, and peace today. Jesus is alive, and because He lives, we too can live. He is Risen indeed!

## ► What is Lent?

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten, meaning “lengthen” and refers to the lengthening days of spring. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan, and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending themselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a “mini-Easter.” This is why you will see the designation “Sunday in Lent” rather than “Sunday of Lent” in the naming of these Sundays. On each Lord’s Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

As we prepare for Resurrection Sunday, let us silence the noise in our lives and ask the Lord to show us what steps we need to take to refocus our heart, mind, and will on Him alone. This Lenten Season, let us cry out to God like David did. “Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me and lead me in the way everlasting”. (Psalm 139:23-24) Amen!

## TONY'S RECYCLING Q&A

**Q: Can I recycle an old microwave oven?**

**A:** Yes! Microwaves contain steel, copper, and aluminum. If you're upgrading to a new one, even if your old microwave still works, let Tony know. He may donate it to Goodwill or ReUzit instead of recycling it.

**Q: Can I recycle an old TV?**

**A:** Yes! TVs, DVD players, VHS players, radios, electric heaters, fans, and similar items contain steel and copper wiring. If your item still works, let Tony know—he may be able to donate it to another organization.

**Q: What can I do with my old lawn mower?**



# BLOODROOT AND SPRING BEAUTIES

Bloodroot and spring beauties are native, woodland wildflowers that bloom early in April in many local woods. These plants have several characteristics in common that make more intriguing.

Created by God, as all life is, both kinds of one-foot tall plants flourish best in rich, moist soil and can tolerate partial shading on dead-leaf carpeted, woodland floors. Both are perennial, emerging from the same roots every spring. Both have beautiful flowers, white ones on bloodroot and pink on spring beauties, that decorate the floors of bottomland woods in the eastern United States, including here in southeastern Pennsylvania.

Both species grow lovely blossoms that are pollinated by bees and flies, including the interesting, fuzzy bee flies. After being fertilized by insects, both plants produce several seeds in seed pods, red ones in bloodroot capsules and black ones in spring beauty pods.

Each bloodroot has a single two-inch, white bloom and one scalloped leaf. And each pretty flower resembles a tiny, white tulip at first, but soon opens fully and looks like a two-inch-across, eight-petaled daisy that blooms for several days. Bloodroot taproots have orange-red sap that gives the plant its name. Spring beauties each have two grass-like leaves and a few lovely, pink blossoms blooming at any one time from early April to early May. Early flowers get pollinated and become seed pods, while new blooms open to be fertilized.

These plants are adaptable, growing lovely colonies of themselves in bottomland woods, and in human-made habitats, including along roadsides and in cow pastures. I have seen patches of bloodroot blooming beautifully along roadsides, here and there, in and near local woods, where they are easily visible to adoring eyes. Apparently, soil was scraped to create roads in woods and dumped to the side. But the bloodroot roots survived and annually bloom since.

I've also seen large parts of some sunny pastures glowing pink in April from millions of spring beauty blossoms. Those meadows were carved from woodlands to create grazing for livestock. But the adaptable spring beauty bulbs in the ground adapted to increased sunlight and lived on in the pastures, adding much beauty to those short-grass habitats.

Bloodroot, spring beauties and other kinds of small, flowering plants develop leaves and flowers early in April so they can benefit from the sun's light and heat before the trees grow leaves that will shade and cool the woodland floors by the end of April. These simple plants also stay short so they can avoid cold winds and soak up heat from the sun-warmed, leaf-covered woods floors.

Native, God-created bloodroots and spring beauties add beauty and charm to certain woods, roadsides and meadows. Look for these lovely wildflowers, and others, when outdoors in April. They are inspiring.
