## Feathered Suburban Characters

Carolina wrens, blue jays and northern mockingbirds are permanent resident, often flamboyant, birds on many older suburban lawns in Lancaster County, and elsewhere across much of the eastern United States. All these feisty, interesting birds, created by God, have characteristics in common, though they are not related to each other. They all consume invertebrates during warmer months, and go to bird feeders in winter. They are all attractive, and the genders of each kind are similar. And they offer cheer and inspiration through their bold, lively actions and boisterous songs and calling on lawns, including ours, through each year, but especially in winter. These feathered characters are a joy to have as neighbors.

Carolina wrens are sparrow-sized, brown and darker-streaked, which camouflages them among shrubbery and on the ground where they search for food. The tail of each wren is usually cocked upright, which plainly demonstrates its spritely personality and constant activities.

Male Carolina wrens loudly sing "tea-kettle, tea-kettle, tea-kettle ....." through the year to proclaim living and nesting territory for himself and his mate. Their ringing songs are a joy to hear, particularly in winter when we hear little bird song.

Some pairs of Carolina wrens raise young in odd places, including in garages, under decks and porches and in outdoor grills, in older suburbs. Other pairs of them, however, hatch offspring in brush piles and other, natural, sheltering places in bottomland woods, and older suburban areas. Young wrens, in their sheltering, grass nurseries, are fed invertebrates.

Blue jays are blue, with black and white trim, making them striking to see. Quiet and secretive in summer when raising young, blue jays are boisterous and noticeable in fall when nesting is finished for the year and the beautifully-feathered jays are flying into the red and brown foliage of pin oak trees in October to gather those trees' acorns. The jays stash those nuts in tree hollows, or poke them into the ground, to eat in winter.

I have seen blue jays courting in May by emitting sweet notes and offering tidbits of food to each other. They build twig and grass, open-cup nurseries in evergreen trees and feed invertebrates to their chicks.

Mockingbirds are mostly gray, with white banners in their wings and tails that we see when they fly and raise their wings while perched as a signal to other mockers. Male mockers are famous for their ability to imitate the songs of other kinds of birds. But they have their own delightful songs they sing, including on moonlit, summer nights.

Mockingbirds raise young in open-cup, twig and grass cradles in sheltering, dense shrubbery. And in autumn, each mocker "stakes a claim" at a patch of berries it will use as winter food. It will attempt to defend those berries from other mockingbirds, and flocks of American robins, starlings, cedar waxwings and other kinds of birds.

Carolina wrens, blue jays and northern mockingbirds are feathered, boisterous characters in the suburbs. They are especially noticeable in fall and winter when they are less cautious in their search for food, even showing up at feeders. Enjoy these attractive, lively birds if you have them on your lawns.
